

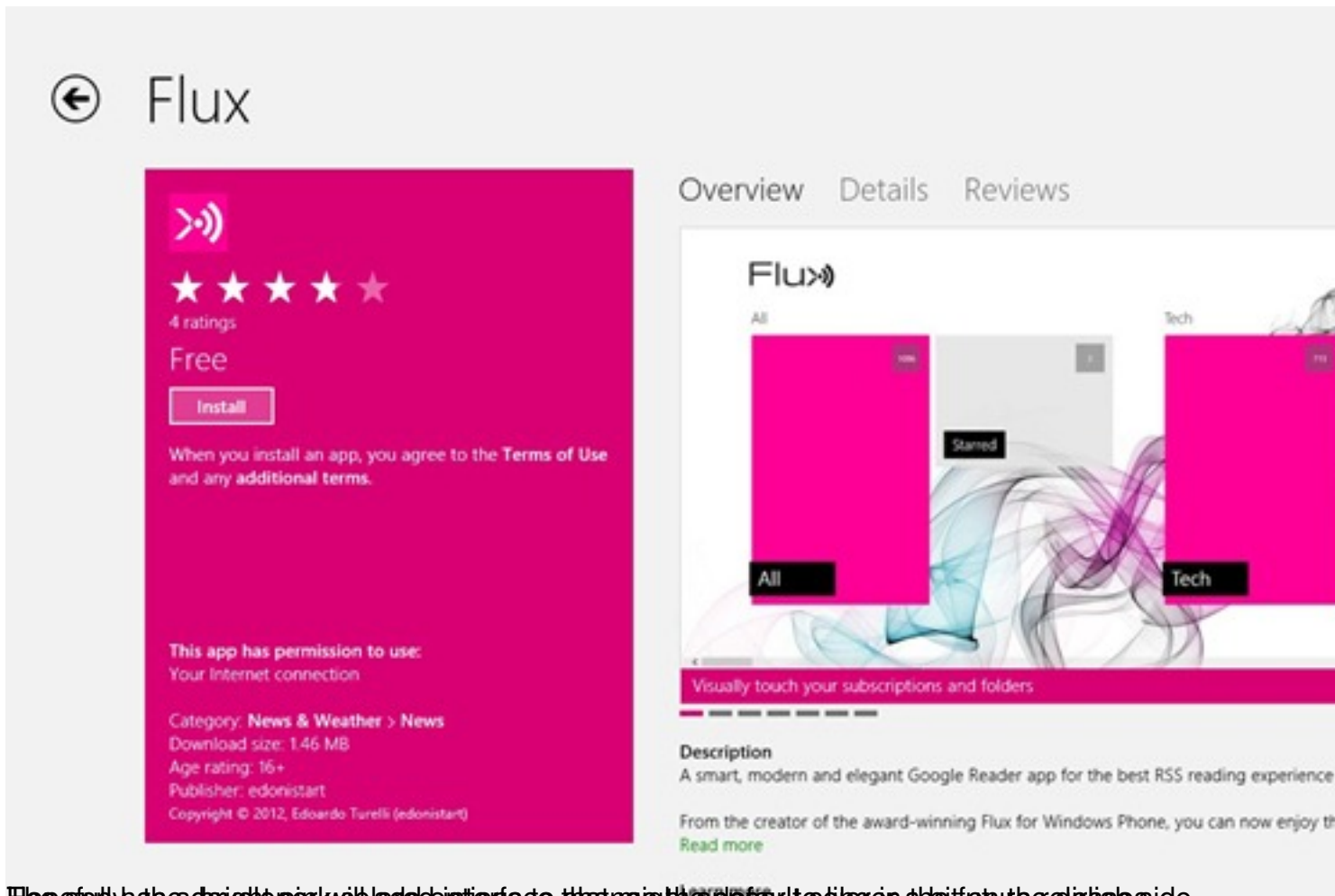
From the operating system itself to the apps coming out for it, everything related to Windows 8 seems to be a lot more fancy than all the previous versions combined. The sleek and colorful Start Screen, the futuristic look of apps, and everything else seems like it is designed to attract new customers towards the product. Yesterday, I covered an app for Windows 8 called LockPic that lets users [change the lock screen background image](#) , and some days ago, Waqas covered Fresh Paint, a [painting app built exclusively for Windows 8](#)

. Even though it is only the RTM version of Windows 8 and there is still some time in the final release, a lot of apps are already available for download in the Windows Store. The Store works in the same way that Google Play works for Android, or iTunes App Store works for iOS; there are both free and paid apps available. Today, we have a beautiful new app for Windows 8 called

### **Flux**

, which allows you to follow your Google Reader feeds without opening the desktop. You can check out all your RSS subscriptions from a unified interface, with options to choose articles as favorites, mark them as unread, and view the mobile version of the post.

To download Flux, go to Windows Store and start typing “Flux”. It will automatically open the search pane and search for the app. When found, click the Install button to download and install it onto your system. Once the process is complete, open your Start screen and click the newly created tile for Flux.



The app has a bright pink color scheme that gives it a modern and clean appearance. The interface is simple and easy to use, with a focus on readability and navigation. The app is available for free on the Windows 8 Store.

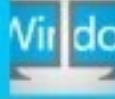

## A Look Into Windows 8 Features For Application Window Management In A Multi-Monitor Setup

Nowadays, most people like to use multi-monitor setup. Not more than one monitor provides extra screen real estate, but prove to be a big time saver, especially if you're a heavy multitasker. Windows 7's approach to multi-monitor setups is nothing short of brilliant, making full use of resolution in games, applications, slideshow presentations and whatnot, but what it lacks is taskbar support for more than one display. For instance, if you wish to use the taskbar across all connected display monitors, you need to use third party applications, as Windows 7 (or any of its predecessors) does not have this option by default. With Windows 8, it looks like Microsoft has finally listened to the users and has addressed this issue. Not only does Windows 8 span the taskbar across all your screens, but it also provides a few useful options to handle the running applications (accessible from taskbar). In what follows, we will explain how you can make use of multi-monitor setup related options available in Windows 8.
